

## The Mighty Creatives secures funding to support children and young people in care and care leavers

The Mighty Creatives receives support to launch one-to-one Creative Mentoring for children in care, as well as care leavers, across the next eighteen months.

**5**<sup>th</sup> **November 2020, Leicester, UK** – <u>The Mighty Creatives</u>, the leading cultural education charity in the East Midlands, has been announced as one of seven organisations to receive funding from a pot of nearly £2 million.

The funding was announced on the 29<sup>th</sup> October, during National Care Leavers' Week, by What Works for Children's Social Care (WWCSC). With around 78,150 children in care and 11,000 young people aged 16-18 leaving care every year, according to the latest government figures for England, reaching these young people has never been more critical.

Provided by a team of specialist Creative Mentors, the tried and tested Creative Mentoring model (pioneered by Derbyshire Virtual School) has been developed for children and young people in the care system who are at greatest risk of not being in education, employment or training. Creative Mentoring activity takes place at home, school or social care settings, across 8 Local Authorities in the East Midlands, and is specially designed to develop creativity and confidence, while improving communication and relationship building.

Creative Mentors working as part of this programme hold a wide range of creative and artistic backgrounds. This includes performance artists, musicians, storytellers, poets, rap artists, potters, photographers and film makers, textile artists and theatre practitioners, painters, woodworkers, and metal workers.

## Kim Johnson, Arts Education Consultant at Derbyshire Virtual Schools comments:

"This award has come just at the right time, to provide high quality support for children and young people who are already disadvantaged and at greatest risk of missing out on education achievement. Whatever their circumstances, no matter how challenging, Creative Mentors will help children and young people feel more connected to others outside of their immediate care network and help them find and develop their interests and enable positive achievement."
